***n + 1* returns to The Kitchen with
The Internet: We All Live There Now, on June 10**

Evening celebrates the publication of the journal's Spring 2008 issue

New York, NY, May 19, 2008—On **Tuesday, June 10**, **The Kitchen** presents an evening with *n+1*, a semi-annual literary journal that nimbly blends pop culture, contemporary literature, critical theory, and politics. The program, entitled *The Internet: We All Live There Now*, will feature a panel of writers including **Mark Greif**, **Benjamin Kunkel**, **Caleb Crain**, and **Moe Tkacik**. The panel will present reports from the online world—on YouTube versus porn, commenter anonymity and identity, and the state of the blog. The panelists will then answer questions from the audience. The evening will begin at **7:00 P.M.** at The Kitchen (512 West 19th Street). Tickets are \$5.

Mark Greif is an editor at *n+1*. Benjamin Kunkel is one of the founding editors of *n+1* and author of the novel *Indecision*. Caleb Crain is the author of the novella 'Sweet Grafton,' which appeared in the Winter 2008 issue of *n+1*. He has also written for the *New Yorker* and the *New York Review of Books*. Moe Tkacik has worked as a reporter for the *Philadelphia Daily News* and the *Wall Street Journal*. She is now an editor at jezebel.com.

Published since 2004, *n+1* features essays by unknown writers—the unpublished and unpublishable fiction of major figures—and politics from the fringe to the mainstream, with an eye for the new idea, the impossible vision and the remarkable work of art. From childrearing to war, money to exercise, television to the university, and literature to oil the journal holds no value sacred except the need to rethink every part of life. *n+1* stands for the survival of the little magazine and public intellect in an era of corporate-run publishing companies.
